Tay Vaughan is a recognized authority and pioneer in multimedia. He is the author of several multimedia books, including "Multimedia: Making It Work" (1996, Osborne/McGraw-Hill) and "Using HyperCard" (1988, Que). He has developed and produced award-winning projects for clients including Apple, Lotus, Microsoft, Novell, and Sun, and is currently president of Timestream, Inc., a multimedia production and Web development company in Oakland, California. He is also a visiting professor at the Interactive Telecommunications Program of the Helsinki School of Economics and Business Administration in Finland.

Vaughan attended Governor Dummer Academy in Byfield, Massachusetts, Oberlin College, the University of California at San Francisco, San Francisco State University, and the Institute for European Studies in Vienna, Austria. He is currently a member of the Computer Press Association, the Institute of Electrical and Electronic Engineers, the Society of Naval Architects and Marine Engineers, and the American Society of Naval Engineers. Vaughan is a licensed Merchant Marine Officer (Master, Near Coastal), a private pilot (single engine, land), is fluent in German, and plays the cello in his spare time.

How the Crusaders, Gutenberg, and Count Volta added value to the human condition.

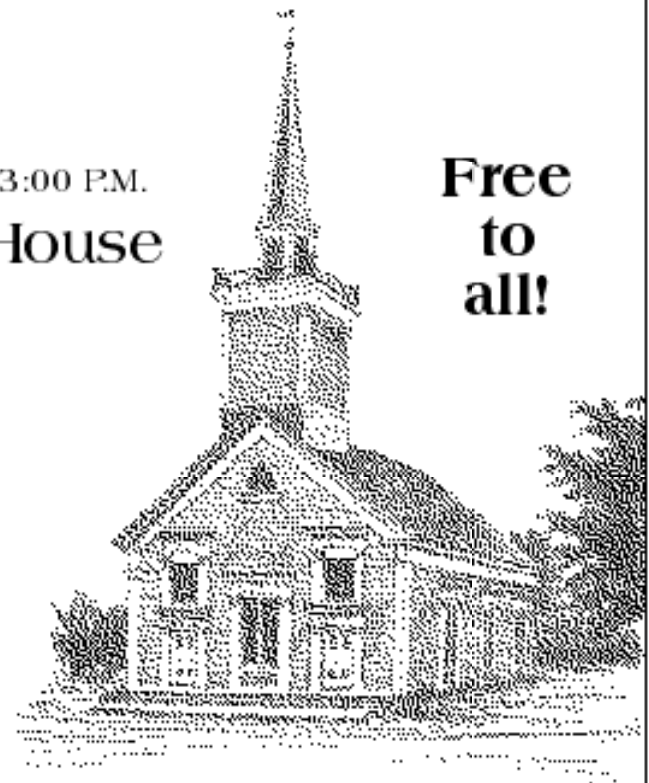
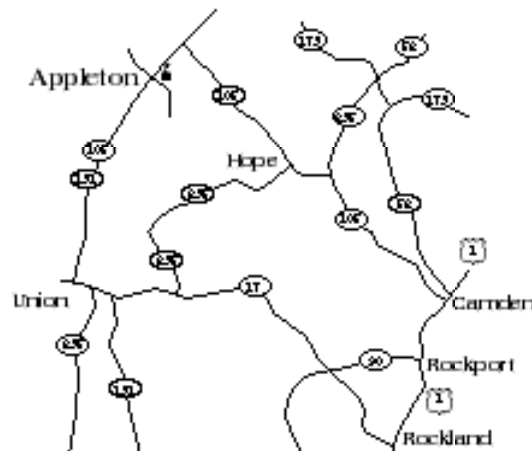
